

CHAIR'S CHAT

Finally, it seems that Spring is on its way and the ground is beginning to dry out. Although this winter and early spring has been less muddy than last year, there have still been times when the soil has been so waterlogged that any new downpour led to more flooding. Many river levels have been high and those around St Albans are no exception. While this has caused flooding in some cases, damaging crops, blocking roads and paths, the high rainfall has also had a good effect in topping up the underground aquifers that feed our local chalk streams.

There are about 200 chalk streams in the world, of which many are in Hertfordshire. They are a very precious local attraction. Because they are fed from underground, they have unusually clear water, with gravel bottoms and little silt. Many of our walks cross or follow them – such as the Lea, Beane, Colne, Mimram, Gade, Chess and of course the river Ver. They usually support a variety of wildlife, including the traditional Hertfordshire watercress industry.

Sadly, however, a number of these precious rivers and streams are currently under threat from various causes, including pollution, water extraction and climate change. The Chess watercress beds are no longer in business as the water is insufficiently clean. In Markyate, Thames Water has been discharging raw sewage into the Ver and overhanging trees and shrubs have also prevented the river from supporting its usual wildlife.

I was pleased to read that the Council has embarked on a project to revitalise it by cutting back branches and shrubs on the river bank through Verulamium park. The path has been blocked off to allow the work to go ahead and we hope that this will soon restore the river to its former health. However, the lakes in Verulamium also have severe problems, as they are seriously flooded and have been for a long time. It seems that the problems are complex, partly because of the number of agencies involved in negotiating a solution, with responsibility shared between the St Albans and

Hertfordshire Councils, the Environment Agency, and Affinity Water. The St Albans District Council website reports that a scheme was finally approved in January this year to reduce the flooding and improve the quality of the water. The lakes will be dredged, with the silt removed and used to provide planting areas round the edges. The river is to remain in its current channel but with wetland development in nearby meadows to help control flooding. These changes will help improve the flow of water through the lakes and lower the water level.

This action is long overdue. The rivers and streams are very precious to everyone who enjoys the Hertfordshire countryside and the lakes in Verulamium are badly in need of this drastic renovation. Whenever we cross a chalk stream, we pause to admire and appreciate the clear water flowing below us. We hope that by summer we'll be able to see a return of the fish, plants and wildlife that makes this such a special pleasure

The OSS and the CPRE are national organisations with local activists who are active in examining planning issues in our area, whereas the other 5 are local charities improving the environment of our local area.

RAMBLERS 'DON'T LOSE YOUR WAY' (DLYW)

Ramblers have been working on their DLYW campaign over the last few years and have identified over 49,000 miles of historic footpaths that are missing from the map in England and Wales and could be lost forever. Originally all rights of way needed to be identified before a revised government deadline of 2031, after which it will no longer be possible to add old paths to the official record.

On Boxing Day 2024, the government announced that it would repeal the deadline to record historic paths, ending the immediate threat to thousands of miles of unrecorded rights of way.

The removal of the deadline has removed the pressure on getting submissions on missing paths registered, but the work still needs to be done.

NATURE NOTES

Although the muddy conditions have been a nuisance to our walking, it has preserved animal tracks very clearly. I have been surprised by the number and variety of deer tracks seen on our walks. We occasionally see individual animals and sometimes small groups but the number of tracks I have seen would indicate that wild deer are far more widespread. Deer found in our area include Muntjac, Roe, Fallow & Sika.

Deer footprints have 2 oblong and pointed toe impressions that sit alongside each other, making the shape of an upside-down heart.



Different species of deer can be hard to tell apart but generally, the size of the footprint can be a clue: -

- Muntjac: 3cm long, 2cm wide
- Roe deer: 5cm long, 4cm wide
- Fallow deer & Sika deer: 7cm long, 5cm wide

Look out for deer tracks on our walks and try and recognise the species.


SOCIETY HISTORY
